The purpose of this course is to build a context for understanding the arts: historically, socially, narratively, politically and scientifically with the intention of making art meaningful to the student's everyday life. Students will explore and analyze influential works of art to gain an understanding of the arts as a method of communication and expression. While reflecting upon and assessing the characteristics and quality of art, students will develop,

explore and express their personal aesthetics through a research projects, class discussions,
